COURSE DESCRIPTION

"Grade 7 students focus on environmental, social, and cultural factors that affect quality of life for people in various places in the world. They study physical and human geography and global demographic trends. Students enhance their awareness of indigenous peoples and explore ways of life in other places. They examine how various factors shape ways of life in a contemporary society of Asia, Africa, or Australasia*. They also focus on a contemporary society in Europe or the Americas as they consider the human impact of urbanization and technological change. Students become aware of the commonalities that link cultures and societies and the disparities that divide them. As they explore global challenges and opportunities, students become aware of the importance of international cooperation and begin to understand their roles as citizens in an increasingly interdependent world," (Grade 7 Social Studies People and Places in the World: A Foundation for Implementation 2006).

YEAR PLAN SUMMARY (TENTATIVE)

Grade 7 Social Studies is divided into four clusters. Each cluster contains a specific number of textbook chapters that correlates with that topic of interest. Each cluster will be given approximate equal teaching time over the year. The tentative teaching schedule is as follows:

CLUSTER DESCRIPTIONS

Cluster 1: World Geography

"Students examine human and physical geography and their connections. This study includes a focus on maps and mapping, population clusters, principal regions, bodies of water, vegetation and climatic zones, more- and less-developed nations, and time zones," (*Grade 7 Social Studies People and Places in the World: A Foundation for Implementation* 2006).

Cluster 2: Global Quality of Life

"Students examine environmental, social, and cultural factors that affect quality of life for people in Canada and other places in the world. This study includes a focus on concepts related to universal human rights, diverse cultural perspectives, citizenship and democracy, identity, and discrimination. Students examine the role of international agencies and global cooperation, the relationship between wealth, resources, and power, as well as the impact of their personal actions on quality of life for people in other places," (*Grade 7 Social Studies People and Places in the World: A Foundation for Implementation* 2006).

Cluster 3: Ways of Life in Asia, Africa, or Australia

"Students examine how various factors shape ways of life in one contemporary society, selected from a choice of Asia, Africa, or Australasia. This study includes a focus on environmental, historical, social, political, and cultural issues, as well as a focus on indigenous peoples. Students also explore economic activities, including work and trade, and consider the impact of technological change, urbanization, industrialization, and westernization within the selected society," (*Grade 7 Social Studies People and Places in the World: A Foundation for Implementation* 2006).

Cluster 4: Human Impact on Europe or the Americas

"Students examine the impact of human activities in one contemporary society, selected from a choice of Europe or the Americas. This study includes a focus on environmental, social, political, cultural, and economic issues. Students explore historical events, climate change, technological development and urbanization, use of natural resources, food production and distribution, and consumerism. They also consider concepts related to sustainable development. Finally, as students assess the consequences of their personal actions and choices, they come to understand their roles

as citizens in an increasingly interdependent world," (*Grade 7 Social Studies People and Places in the World: A Foundation for Implementation* 2006).

ACADEMIC ASSESSMENT

Assessment will be based on a variety of activities that cater to the various learning styles of students. Individual and group projects, assignments, textbook exercises, class discussions, and additional in-class activities will be part of the evaluation of the course. Rubrics will be given for major projects and assignments prior to starting the project or assignment. The teacher will review all guidelines prior to the assignment or project beginning, but it is your responsibility to ask for additional help or clarification if you do not understand the assignment or project. All due dates will be discussed at the beginning of the project. Peer and self-assessment will also be used throughout the year. All course tests and major projects will be weighted out of 100, and all other assignments will be based on their denominator (number of questions). All content is cumulative and will contribute towards 100% of the final grade. All content will be reported on in the following categories, as per the Manitoba Report card requirements. This will be reported on in a percentage, as well as a 1-4.

- Knowledge and Understanding
- Research and Communication
- Critical Thinking and Citizenship
