Music Room Notes M

It's been a lively start to the year in the music room! From our youngest learners to our seasoned high school musicians, students are diving into new musical experiences with energy and enthusiasm.

Kindergarten and Grade 1 students have been exploring rhythm and melody through singing and playing Orff instruments. These hands-on percussion instruments help young learners internalize musical concepts in a fun and active way.

In **Grade 2**, students are beginning to learn basic chords on the **ukulele**, developing both their fine motor skills and musical ear. The cheerful sound of ukes can be heard across the hall as students strum their first songs!

Grade 3 students are picking up **guitars** for the first time, starting with simple notes and basic technique. Meanwhile, **Grade 5 and 6** students are building on previous experience, continuing their journey with more complex chords, strumming patterns, and songs.

In **Grade 7**, students are taking their first steps into the world of **wind instruments**—an exciting milestone! They are being supported by our **Grade 8** students, who are stepping into leadership roles by mentoring their younger peers and sharing the skills they've developed.

At the **high school level**, students are focusing on their chosen instruments—whether it be **guitar**, **bass**, **drums**, **piano**, **or wind instruments**. They are working individually and in small groups.





Classroom Newsletter Kindergarten Ms. Speiss



Welcome to school. The students are starting to get into the groove at McCreary School.

This month, our students have been strengthening their fine motor skills through fun and engaging activities! They've been tracing letters using shaving cream, stretching elastics around paper towel rolls and even threading fruit loops onto spaghetti sticks. These hands-on activities help build the eye-hand coordination they need for writing and other tasks.

We've also been diving into the letter sounds. The children have learned the letter "a" sound is created when your mouth is wide open. For the letter "s", they keep their tongue behind their teeth while smiling to make the "sss" sound. The letter "m" involves closed lips, with air flowing through the nose, and for the letter "t", the tongue needs to be just behind the top teeth. We are practicing printing both upper and lowercase letters, starting from the top and moving down, so they can build strong penmanship skills.

In addition to phonics, we've been learning some fun morning songs to help us remember the days of the week and count to twenty. In math, we have been working on recognizing numbers and printing them.

I am looking forward to planning even more fun and enriching activities to support their growth in the future. Stay tuned for more updates.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Welcome back everyone! It has been a wonderful start to our year, and I couldn't be happier to have this group again this year. We have started strong, and will continue to maintain the momentum throughout the whole year.

We do monthly book reports in the classroom, so please know that they will always be due on the last day of the month, or close to the end of that week. The September book report is due on October 3rd.

On October 14th, Ms. Dunning will be joining our classroom for 5 weeks, as she will be doing her 3rd practicum placement in our classroom. We are very excited for her to be coming, as we cannot wait to see what kind of lessons she will show us!

MATH

We are working through our first few units in Math, and have been working on patterns, comparing and ordering numbers, as well as regrouping for addition. When Ms. Dunning arrives, she will be introducing the kids to fractions.

ELA

We have started off the year by switching to a book report format, instead of a daily reading expectation. This is to try and foster more independence in their reading.

Our regular spelling program is up and running, and tests will always be on the last day of the week, unless otherwise stated.

The kids will begin a novel study with Ms. Dunning when she arrives, but I am going to keep the book title a secret.

SCIENCE

We have been working on our Weather unit in science, learning about the different types of weather, and how it differs from climate.

SOCIAL STUDIES

We have started our social studies content with the First People of Canada. In this unit, we learn about the earliest people to live in Canada, as well as how the Ice Age affected the landscape of the future country.

Grade 8 Math

They have also been practicing problem-solving with integers to strengthen their understanding and application of these concepts.

The first unit on contour line challenged them to draw what they truly see rather than what they assume, leading to some wonderfully expressive and imaginative pieces.



RE: VISION AND HEARING SCREENING

Dear Parents, Guardians, and Caregivers:

Please be informed that during the months of October and November we will be screening your child's vision and hearing. Our vision and hearing screener has been scheduled to come to your child's school to complete the first screening. This year, we are doing odd grades (K,1.3,5,7,9,11) and new students who have registered with our schools.

If your child is flagged with a hearing concern, they will be referred to our Speech Pathologist who will do a second screening. You will also receive a letter notifying you that a follow-up will be occurring. If they are flagged a second time, you will receive a letter recommending your child be further checked with your optometrist or audiologist.

These screenings are not a substitute for a comprehensive exam by a medical professional but can help identify students who may need further evaluation.
